Notes: The B.A. in Psychology at Temple University consists of 44 credits, including 4 credits in a designated science area. Per the Residency Requirement, students must complete at least half of major credits at TU.

- 1) The College of Liberal Arts at Temple University requires all students to complete at least two levels of a foreign language. A 101-level foreign language course at Bucks will partially fulfill this requirement.
- 2) The College of Liberal Arts at Temple University requires all students to complete at least two levels of a foreign language. A 102-level foreign language course at Bucks will satisfy this requirement.
- 3) Students should select SOCI 120: Introduction to Cultural Anthropology. SOC 120 transfer to Temple as ANTH 1061: Cultures of the World. This course will satisfy the CLA Foreign Language/Global Studies requirement. Students who do not complete SOCI 120 will need to complete one of the following at Temple: a third semester of foreign language; or a Global Studies course; or a GenEd Global/World Society course; or study abroad at an approved program
- 4) Students should select a transferable course using the transfer equivalency tool on the Temple University Undergraduate Admissions website: <http://admissions.temple.edu/transfer-equivalency-tool>
- 5) Students should select one (1) course from the following: PSYC181; PSYC200; PSYC280; or PSYC230.

- 1) To earn a CLA baccalaureate degree, a student must complete a minimum of 123 credits, including: 90 credits in CLA/CST courses, 45 credits of which must be at the upper level (numbered 2000-4999). Of that, 6 credits must be outside the student's major division (e.g. Social Sciences or Humanities). Transfer courses can be used to fulfill these requirements.
 - a. Applicable transfer courses may counted toward the completed dddd
- 2) Temple University requires that all undergraduate degree candidates complete 45 hours of the last 60 hours of the degree or program as matriculated students at Temple University. If a matriculated student previously took Temple courses on a non-matriculated basis, those courses are counted towards this requirement.
