Notes:

1. Students who transfer with an A.A.S. in Hotel/Restaurant Management: Hotel Option from Northampton Community College will be required to complete Temple's 45+ General Education requirements. Note that courses have been recommended at both NCC and Temple that will satisfy remaining GenEd areas. Students who follow these recommendations should be able to graduate in eight semesters.
2. HOSP 105 and HOTL 207 transfer to Temple individually as STHM *** lower level electives. The combination of HOSP 105 and HOTL 207 will satisfy THM 3324: Hospitality Operations.
3. Students should select ECO 201: Macroeconomics. ECO 201 transfers to Temple as ECON 1101: Macroeconomic Principles and satisfies a major requirement. Students transferring without ECO 201 major require additional time to degree completion.
4. Students should select MAT 120: Nature of Mathematics, MAT 140: College Algebra, MAT 145: Trigonometry or MAT 180: Calculus I. MAT 120 transfers to Temple as MATH 1011: College Math. MAT 140 transfers to Temple as MATH 1021: College Algebra. MAT 145 transfers to Temple as MATH 1022: Precalculus. MAT 180 transfers to Temple as MATH 1041: Calculus I. Any of these four courses will satisfy Temple's General Education Quantitative Literacy (GQ) area. Students transferring without one of these courses may require additional time to degree completion.
5. HOSP 210 and HOS 201 transfer to Temple individually as STHM lower level electives. The combination of HOS 210 and HOSP 201 will satisfy THM 3311: Managing Organizations in Tourism and Hospitality.
6. Students should select HOTL 160: Introduction to the Gaming Industry for their required elective. HOTL 160 transfers to Temple as THM 3328: Gaming & Casino Management.
7. Students should select BUS 205: Management Fundamentals. BUS 205 transfers to Temple as HRM 1101: Leadership and Organization Management and satisfies a major requirement.. Students transferring without this course may require additional time to degree completion.
8. Students should select one of the following courses to fulfill the GenEd Arts requirements: ART 101: Art History, ART 107: Drawing I, ART 110: Principles of 3-D Design or ART 158: Painting I. Art 101: Art History transfers to Temple as ARTH L***. ART 107 transfer to Temple as ARTU 1401: Intro to Visual Language Drawing. ART 110 transfer to Temple as ARTU 1501: Intro to Visual Language – Design. ART 158: Painting transfers to Temple as ARTU 1101: Intro to Visual Language Painting. Students transferring without one of these courses may require additional time to degree completion.
9. Pending review and approval of portfolio by Temple's STHM department, this course may fulfill STHM 3185: Internship I.
10. Students should select a transferable course using the transfer equivalency tool on the Temple University Undergraduate Admissions website: <http://admissions.temple.edu/transfer-equivalency-tool>
